### **Important Dates**

## **Gardening Etiquette**

There is basic gardening etiquette that should be followed by YCGC gardeners. Here are some of the major items:

- All watering is to be done manually (ie., using watering cans or pails, NOT a spray hose hooked up to the water outlet)
- all members are responsible for ensuring that the water tap and storage shed are locked up before they leave the site
- all tools should be stored in the shed after you are finished using them
- members should use organic gardening methods
- pathways should be kept clear of tools, refuse from your garden, etc.
- all children (and pets) are to be supervised by adults while at the garden site
- Please put all garbage in garbage bins in sheds, not in the bin used for weeds kept next to composters
- Smokers, please put all butts in coffee tins (there is usually one standing on picnic table near shed)

### **Food Security Plots**

Part of being a member at YCGC is to help maintain a food security plot. Members personal plots are situated along the perimeter of the garden, food security plots (FSP's) in the centre. Vegetables grown in FSP's should be low maintenance, easy to grow and easy to harvest. Root vegetables are suggested as they also hold longer when given to eventual recipients (Salvation Army, Food Bank, Women's Shelter, etc.). Members are responsible for planting, tending and harvesting the FSP's located beside their own personal plot. Responsibilities for tending these plots are shared between members of the two plots adjacent to each FSP. Whether you and your neighbours share the responsibility of this plot together, or divide the FSP in two, is up to you.

### Do you need help with Planting?

New members that may want help planting should call Roxanne or Lisette. There is a list started and they will contact people to arrange dates.

### **Starter Plants Available**

Lisette says she knows someone who has rosemary and French tarragon starter plants to give away. These are perennials. Please contact Lisette if interested.

### A Beginners Garden

The following advice from a previous YCGC newsletter. For a garden 10' X 16', make 11 rows each 10' long, of the following:

<u>PLANT</u>
zucchini (4 plants)
tomatoes (5 plants)
peppers (6 plants)
cabbage
bush beans
lettuce
beets
carrots
chard
radishes
marigolds

One of the site managers suggests this as a Whatto-Grow list: lettuce, carrots, beets, beans, peas, potatoes, zucchini, and flowers.

# **Features of the Community Garden**

- X Water tap located halfway down the garden around plot 21 and 16.
- X Members' personal plots have been situated along the perimeter (see numbered plots on diagram) to allow members to take advantage of using the fence for gardening.
- X Food security plots have been situated in the centre (see shaded plots) to allow members of adjacent plots to share gardening duties. This layout also ensures that everyone can easily keep an eye on the progress of all food security gardens.
- X Personal plots are 10' x 18' and food security plots are slightly smaller (10' x 10').
- X The type of vegetable grown in each food security plot to be determined by the Board in consultation with members. These vegetables should be low maintenance, easy to grow, and easy to harvest/provide to food security groups.

Members' Responsibilities for Food Security Plots:

- X Members are responsible for planting, tending and harvesting the food security plot located beside their own personal plot.
- X Responsibilities for tending these plots are shared between members of the two plots adjacent to each plot. For example, members of plot #7 work with members of plot #20 to look after growing vegetables in food security plot G.
